**Seed Swap at Wisley** on 1st February, 10am-3pm, The Garden Room, Hilltop. Join us for the biggest collection of seeds we have ever had in one place! Seeds collected from our gardens, rare and unusual Plant Heritage seeds, specialist seed from plant societies and hundreds of packets from our plant centre. There is no restriction on the number of packets you can take, but they are intended for your personal use, so please only take what you can grow this year to avoid waste, and leave plenty of choice for others. On  $20^{th}$  November we held our AGM ,

On the 11<sup>th</sup> December we had a *festive Flower Arranging* morning with mince pies and gingerbread and mulled wine. **Elizabeth Barralet** was having a very stressful time, as she had moved to Hawkhurst in Kent only two weeks before, but didn't want to cancel coming to us, although it was now a two hour drive. She had had to manage the move by herself as her poor husband was ill in hospital with pneumonia, and condensing a four bedroom house into a one bedroom barn conversion was a lot of work. Now the hospital want her to bring in her husband's sturdy walking shoes, and she doesn't know which of fifty unpacked boxes they could be in! She also doesn't know where the good flower shops in Kent are yet, so bought some supermarket ones.

Oasis is not very ecologically friendly, but the alternatives are not very good either, so she is using up what she has got. We were intrigued by the coloured lilies, and told this could be done by putting them in dye and the colour will change as they suck it up. Quink ink makes a lovely blue. Feathers can be sprayed. The first arrangement was a basic outline of green leaves with sparkly copper sprayed stems of leaves and twisty spirals of gold and the coloured lilies, set off with some red stems of dogwood.

**Elizabeth** had had some trouble finding her equipment as she used to have a huge shed full of flower arranging vases and such, and now has to downsize, so was happy for us to keep the vases if we won one of the arrangements in the raffle.

The second arrangement was of white roses, with the leaves removed to look stark and icy. Roses can last 2/3 weeks, take off 2" of stem first. If a flower droops, try cutting off more stem, and perhaps moving it to the

centre so other flowers will support it. Maybe even a paper collar to hold it straight. Have your flowers at different heights, but don't get stressed about having odd numbers, if it looks right that's it! These were set off with silver sprayed fir cones, blue baubles and laurel stems which had been wired either side of the stem and bent into loops. A wired white ribbon bow completed the look.

The third arrangement was a low level one planned for the centre of a table. This had a shallow dish with conifer stems out sideways in a circle, variegated stems in the centre. Cut stems back to a leaf joint so there are no jagged edges. Then pink carnations filled the centre, you will need to keep changing the water, and some Roses chocs attached to wire nestled amongst the leaves. The shiny wrappings looked very festive, but watch out, some sweets have changed to dull wrapping and wouldn't look as good.

The final arrangement was of two sets of different coloured roses, one set taller, linked with fir cones between the two, and set off by fake tiny bright red fly agaric mushrooms with their jolly white spots.

Lots of ideas to think about, and very kind of her to donate the flowers.

Membership of the Tendershoots online gardening club is included in your Epsom Garden Society membership, however there is a cost to the society in offering this benefit and we wonder if there is enough interest in Tendershoots to justify the cost, as so far, only a few members have signed up for this. There are three talks in February, on the 7<sup>th</sup> at 8pm **Guy Deakins** will tell us about '*Shrodinger's Garden'*, on the 12<sup>th</sup> **Katherine Crouch** will talk about '*Exotic Gardening*,' also at 7.15. Personally I have found it very useful, and have three talks from November and December to tell you about whenever we have an empty space. It will save you being told about books that I have been reading! Nothing horticultural over Christmas either, only weighty tomes about a time travelling lady who ended up at the Battle of Culloden and met bonnie Prince Charlie.

### What we should be doing in the garden if we can get out there:

Remove dead leaves and flowers to prevent grey mould in the greenhouse.

Recut lawn edges for a neat finish.

Pull off yellowing leaves from brassicas to reduce food for slugs.

Weed bare soil and mulch with your lovely home-made compost.

Cut out a third of the darker stemmed wood in blackcurrants at the base, they fruit on new branches.
